Growing Significance of Local Policy

- Declining Federal Housing Funding and Shrinking Federal Role
 - In the past six years the discretionary budget for HUD Housing Assistance program scumulatively fell $47\,4\%$
 - Affirm atively Furthering Fair Housing is limited in federal enforcement power
- ▶ LocalPolicies are Essential and Can be Effective
 - \bullet Local governm ents have broad housing and planning powers that can be $\mathfrak m$ ore strategically leveraged
 - \bullet Regulations are in pactful. Funding rem ain a critical local challenge, but
 - private m arket regulations can prom ote greater affordability.

 Best Practices: There are num erous exam ples of policies that have prom oted greater affordable housing opportunities

W hy an Inclusive Com m unities toolkit?

- The toolkitprom otes a comprehensive fram ework for local leaders to better align resources with the communities expected outcomes
- Com m unities and local governments are often limited in capacity and need more information and strategy support.
- Housing needs and policy priorities vary widely by place; therefore, housing strategies must be tailored to the local market
- To be effective, multiple local strategies are required

W hat is the toolkit?

- Fram ework of local housing policy strategies
- ▶ Structured based on 3 types of housing policies with various questions oriented in the context of housing needs.



- Type 1: 'Do No Hamm' Policies to Preserve Existing Hom es and ProtectResidents.
- Type 2:Policies to Improve Housing Choice and Opportunity.
- ▶ Type 3:Policies that capitalize on market activity for new affordable and mixedincome development.

${\tt Type 1:} \\ {\tt Tenant \& Hom eowner Protections,} \\ {\tt Housing Preservation}$

- Challenges: Displacement, rising costs, and stagnantwages pose major threats to keeping renters and some homeowners housed.
- Strategies: 'Do No Harm "policies are a first response aim ed at protecting existing residents and housing stock at risk
 - Right of First Refusal fortenants in affordable buildings for sale
 - Acquisition and Rehab assistance for nonprofits to maintain
 affordability.
 - Land Banking to acquire and rem ediate blighted properties

Type 2:Policies to Improve Housing Choice, Mobility, & Opportunity

- Challenges: Rising income inequality and limited access to high opportunity communities threaten to polarize society.
- Strategies: Proactive policies that can be adopted to reverse the trends and promote local economic and racial inclusion.
 - Downpaym entassistance to improve access to homeownership
 - Com m unity Land Trusts to m aintain perm anent affordability
 - Prohibiting Source of Income Discrimination to improve access

Type 2:Policies to Improve Housing Choice, Mobility, & Opportunity

Case Study Exam ple:

- Philadelphia Housing TrustFund (2005)
 - Dedicated source of funding using 100% of the Mortgage recording fee
 - • Generated \$135 m illion in FY 2014 for Affordable Housing program s
 - 50% offinds serves households below 30% AM I and rem ander serves households between 30% -115% AM I.50% used for housing production.

Type 3: Policies that use the Market to Increase Affordability

- Challenges: As housing and land values increase, a small share of landowners receive most of the benefit, while the lowest incomes bear higher costs and displacement pressures.
- Strategies: "Strike while the iron shot" policies that leverage market strength to promote economic inclusion through policies that capture and reinvestivalue.
 - In pactFeesassessed on new developm entto m itigate workforce housing needs.
 - Com m unity BenefitsAgreem ents requires developerm eet certain term s/m itigations in exchange for developm entapproval.

Type 3: Policies that use the Market to Increase Affordability

- Portland TIF Set-Aside Requirem ents for Affordable Housing
 - Requires 45% of citywide Tax Increment Financing (TIF) revenue is directed to affordable housing.
 - Directed \$152 m illion in investment into affordable housing for low income and workforce residents

The Lusive Communities Process Community Housing Needs Process Assessment What is the state of housing and affordability issues in our community? What is the broad set of policy options available? What strategies are most effective to address our highest priorities?



Policy Decision Process Policy Decision Process Threshold: Should this strategy be considered? Does it address one or more priority needs identified through data? How does it respond to diverse community values? (ex: preservation vs increase supply) Is it legal?

Policy Decision Process

Criteria: Can this policy be implemented quickly, cheaply and well?

(as compared to other solutions to the same problem)

Example Criteria

- Efficiency
- Scale of Impact
- Administrative Feasibility
- Start-Up Time/Costs
- Political Viability

- > Strengthened relationships between various stakeholders


