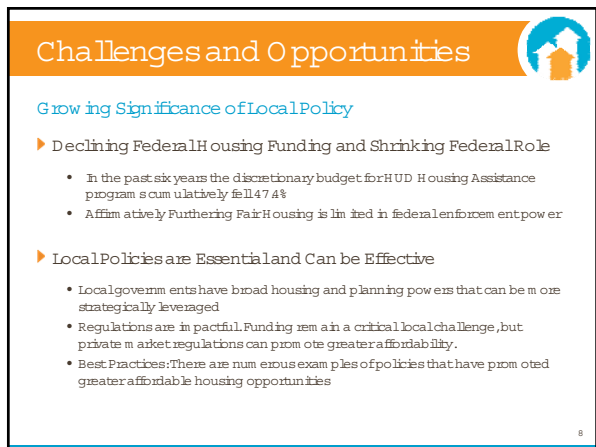

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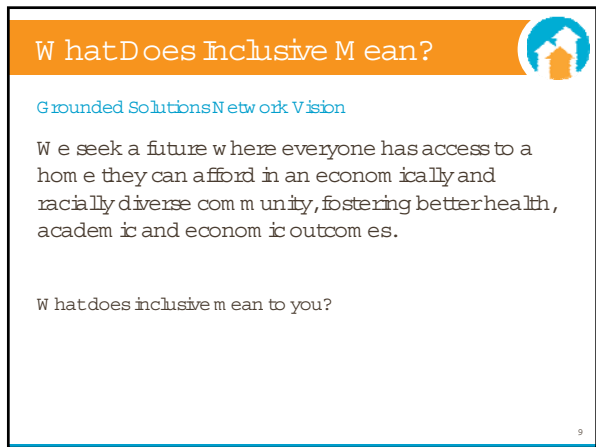


Challenges and Opportunities

Growing Significance of Local Policy

- ▶ Declining Federal Housing Funding and Shrinking Federal Role
 - In the past six years the discretionary budget for HUD Housing Assistance programs cumulatively fell 47.4%
 - Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing is limited in federal enforcement power
- ▶ Local Policies are Essential and Can be Effective
 - Local governments have broad housing and planning powers that can be more strategically leveraged
 - Regulations are impactful. Funding remains a critical local challenge, but private market regulations can promote greater affordability.
 - Best Practices: There are numerous examples of policies that have promoted greater affordable housing opportunities

Why an Inclusive Communities toolkit?

- ▶ The toolkit promotes a **comprehensive framework** for local leaders to better align resources with the communities expected outcomes
- ▶ Communities and local governments are often limited in capacity and need more **information and strategy support**.
- ▶ Housing needs and policy priorities vary widely by place; therefore, housing strategies must be **tailored to the local market**.
- ▶ To be effective, multiple local strategies are required

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Inclusive Communities Toolkit 

What is the toolkit?

- ▶ Framework of local housing policy strategies
- ▶ Structured based on 3 types of housing policies with various questions oriented in the context of housing needs.

- ▶ Type 1: "Do No Harm" Policies to Preserve Existing Homes and Protect Residents.
- ▶ Type 2: Policies to Improve Housing Choice and Opportunity.
- ▶ Type 3: Policies that capitalize on market activity for new affordable and mixed-income development.

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Inclusive Communities Toolkit 

Type 1: Tenant & Homeowner Protections, Housing Preservation

- ▶ **Challenges:** Displacement, rising costs, and stagnant wages pose major threats to keeping renters and some homeowners housed.
- ▶ **Strategies:** "Do No Harm" policies are a first response aimed at protecting existing residents and housing stock at risk.
 - Right of First Refusal for tenants in affordable buildings for sale
 - Acquisition and Rehab assistance for nonprofits to maintain affordability
 - Land Banking to acquire and remediate blighted properties

Type 1: Tenant & Homeowner Protections, Housing Preservation


Case Study Example

▶ Oakland Renters Upgrade Initiative (2016)

- Undergoing unprecedented displacement crisis
- Extends Just Cause Evictions
- Expands Rent Control

Type 2: Policies to Improve Housing Choice, Mobility, & Opportunity

▶ **Challenges:** Rising income inequality and limited access to high opportunity communities threaten to polarize society.

▶ **Strategies:** Proactive policies that can be adopted to reverse the trends and promote local economic and racial inclusion.

- Downpayment assistance to improve access to homeownership
- Community Land Trusts to maintain permanent affordability
- Prohibiting Source of Income Discrimination to improve access

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Inclusive Communities Toolkit 

Type 2: Policies to Improve Housing Choice, Mobility, & Opportunity

Case Study Example:

▶ Philadelphia Housing Trust Fund (2005)

- Dedicated source of funding using 100% of the Mortgage recording fee
- Generated \$135 million in FY 2014 for Affordable Housing programs
- 50% of funds serves households below 30% AMI and remainder serves households between 30% -115% AMI. 50% used for housing production.

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Inclusive Communities Toolkit 

Type 3: Policies that use the Market to Increase Affordability

- ▶ **Challenges:** As housing and land values increase, a small share of landowners receive most of the benefit, while the lowest income bear higher costs and displacement pressures.
- ▶ **Strategies:** "Strike while the iron's hot" policies that leverage market strength to promote economic inclusion through policies that capture and reinvest value.
 - Impact Fees assessed on new development to mitigate workforce housing needs.
 - Community Benefits Agreements requires developer meet certain terms/negotiations in exchange for development approval.

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Inclusive Communities Toolkit 

Type 3: Policies that use the Market to Increase Affordability

- ▶ **Portland TIF Set-Aside Requirements for Affordable Housing**
 - Requires 45% of citywide Tax Increment Financing (TIF) revenue is directed to affordable housing.
 - Directed \$152 million in investment into affordable housing for low income and workforce residents

Community Housing Needs Process

Assessment **Strategies** **Prioritization**

What is the state of housing and affordability issues in our community? → What is the broad set of policy options available? → What strategies are most effective to address our highest priorities?

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Inclusive Communities Process 

Policy Decision Process

Threshold **Criteria** **Design**

Does it address one of our identified priority needs? → Is it better than other solutions to the same problem? → How do we tailor it for our community?

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Inclusive Communities Process 

Policy Decision Process

▶ **Threshold:** Should this strategy be considered?

Example Threshold

- Does it address one or more priority needs identified through data?
- How does it respond to diverse community values? (ex: preservation vs increase supply)
- Is it legal?

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Inclusive Communities Process

Policy Decision Process

▶ Criteria: Can this policy be implemented quickly, cheaply and well?
(as compared to other solutions to the same problem)

Example Criteria

- Efficiency
- Scale of Impact
- Administrative Feasibility
- Start-Up Time/Costs
- Political Viability

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Inclusive Communities Process

Policy Decision Process

▶ Design: How do we tailor this policy for our community?

Example Design Process:

- Learn from Best Practices
- Fit with the Market
- Leverage Existing Programs and Resources

- ▶ Strengthened relationships between various stakeholders

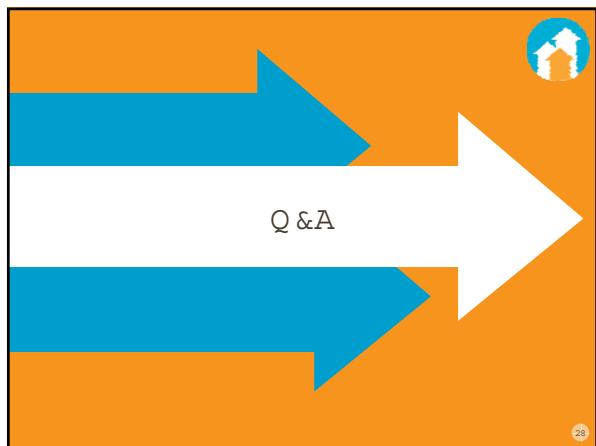
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Lessons from Pittsburgh, PA
